ulation of Murphy is given at 2,433 in 1950 against 1,873 in 1940, showing a gain in population for Murphy of 23 per cent in the ten-year period.

Andrews has a total of 1.397 population in 1950 against & total of 1,520 in 1940, indicating a loss of 8.8 per cent in ten years.

Clay County lost 6.2 per cent population in the ten year period dropping from 6,405 in 1940 to 6,006 in 1950. Hayesville shows a gain of 5.6 per cent increasing from 336 in 1940 to 356 in 1950.

Graham County gained 7.3 per cent population in this period having 6,418 population in 1940 but increased to 6,886 in 1950. The gain is also shown in Robbinsville with a 1940 population of 399 which grew to 515 in 1950, a gain
