Be Immunized Dr. J. W. R. Norton, State Health Officer, has announced that North Carolina leads the nation in diphtheria in the proportion of cases per 100,000 population.

Norton's report reveals that the case rate in North Carolina was 12.4 per 100.000 as against a national rate of 3.9 per 100,000.

In 1950 there were 500 diphtheria cases in North Carolina, with nunized.
