Complete 82 Per **Cent Of State** Road Program

More than 4,000 miles of county yeads were hardsurfaced in North rolina last year with funds from the \$200,000,000 secondary road

Official year-end figures, released by Highway Chairman Henry V. Jordan, showed that the State Highway Commission had completed 82 per cent of the 12,000-mile secondary paving goal set by Governor Scott when the bond issue was approved by the voters of North Carollina in the 1949 referendum

erendum.

A total of 4,025,1 miles of secondary roads were paved in 1881, bringing the total milese hard-surfaced under the bond program 9,836.5 miles. In the previous eer, 4.554.6 miles were paved.
