Bishop Harrell To Speak At Methodist Rally

Methodists of Cherokee, Clay and Graham Counties will assemble in Murphy First Methodist Church Monday, March 17, at 7:30 p. m. for a special Methodist Rally.

Bishop Costen J. Harrell, resident bishop of the Charlotte Area of the Methodist Church, will be the featured speaker. His subject will be "Our Methodist Heritage."

Others to participate on the program will be the Rev. W. Jackson Hinescutt, Superintendent of the Waynesville District, the Rev. R. Delbert Byrum, pastor of First Methodist Church in Murphy; the Rev. E. L. Kirk, pastor of the Andrews Methodist Church; and Olen Stratton, president of the Murphy Area Subdistrict Organization of Methodist Men.

Special music will consist of congregational singing and an anthem, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee" by Schnecker, to be rendered by the choir of First Methodist Church. Mr. Frederick Schley will be featured in a violin obligation for the anthem.

Bishop Harrell is one of the prominent leaders of the Methodist Church. He received his education at Duke University and Vanderbilt University, and has received honorary degrees from Randolph-Macon College, Duke University and Birmingham Southern College. Some of his prominent pastorates include Durham, Raleigh, Richmond, Atlanta, Norfolk and Nashville.

At the time of his election to the episcopacy in 1944 Bishop Harrell was pastor of the West End Methodist Church, Nashville, Tenn., of the campus of Vanderbilt University. For four years he served the Birmingham Area and since 1948 he has served the Charlotte Area which embraces the entire State of South Carolina (South Carolina Conference) and the Western North Carolina Conference.

Families To Undertake Financial Planning

Three outstanding goals have been adopted by the Cherokee County Home Demonstration Clubs as a result of recent demonstrations on Financial Planning. The first is to establish a family council, not only to do financial planning but to discuss and plan all activities and solve family difficulties and problems; the second, for each family to do financial planning, either an annual plan or a monthly plan; and the third, to establish a business center in the home.

The home management chairman in each club has been asked to make a survey on these three goals: First, the number of families having already realized these goals; second, the number who realize these goals during the remainder of 1952.

Some of the points stressed in this demonstration on Financial

Planning were: (1) All the family plans in the planning; (2) A family starts where they are, facing debts and present spending habits; (3) Each member of the family cooperates by adjusting his expenditures to the needs of others and in using and caring for family property; (4) Each individual family to develop their own plan, based on their own experiences, ambitions, tastes and habits; (5) Each member of the family given his own personal allowance planned to take care of specific needs; (6) In case of emergencies, all decide the situation is to be handled and where cuts are to be made; (7) If a financial plan is to succeed the family must keep clearly in mind what they want most out of life and don't lose sight of it. The film strip, "Managing the Family Income" was used as a part of the demonstration.

A Rural Church Development Conference for this region will be held on Wednesday, March 19, at Peachtree Baptist Church near Murphy. This conference is for all pastors in Tuskaloogie, Macon, Tennessee River, Western North Carolina and West Liberty Associations. Each pastor may invite one layman from each church to attend.

To Add Six County Roads To State System

Six roads in Cherokee County will be added to the State Highway System pending the approval of the Highway Commission in Raleigh, according to L. Dale Thrash, 10th Division Highway Commissioner.

The roads are: Sour John, 1.2 miles; Parsons Branch, 0.55 mile; John Elliott, 0.80 mile; Newt Wilson, 0.70 mile; Sneed Branch, 1.19 miles; Old Ducktown, 0.50 mile.

"After these roads have been added to the State System they will be graded, drained and rocked just as soon as the highway forces can get to them," says Thrash.

He says other mud roads will be added to the State system as fast as the Highway Department can absorb them.
