Mrs. Oscar Mulkey Is Circle Hostess

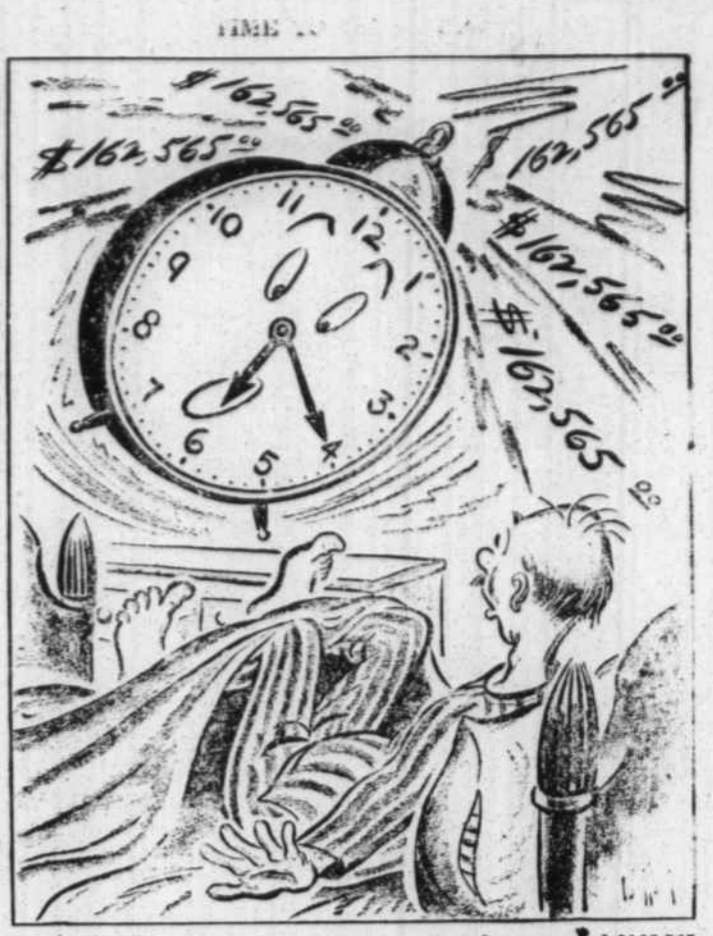
Mrs. Oscar Mulkey was hostess to the Ruth Bagley Circle Monday evening.
