Butler Completes Basic Training

Third Army Headquarters, Atlanta, Ga.—Warrant Officer (Junior Grade) Ray C. Pullium, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Pullium, of Andrews, N. C., has received an appointment in his same rank in the Organized Reserve Corps in ceremonies at Third Army Headquarters, Fort McPherson, Ga.

Under provisions of a new Department of the Army regulation, warrant officers on active duty and holding temporary warrants in the Army of the United States may, upon application, be given Reserve appointments. The CRC appointment does not terminate temporary AUS appointments now held, and will not affect present duty status. The change is made possible by a new Army policy which for the first time makes provisions for the grade of Warrant Officer in the Organized Reserve.

Warrant Officer Pullium, now assigned to duty with the Adjutant General's section at Third Army headquarters, is a graduate of the Andrews High school.

He first entered the Army in 1934, and during World War II, saw service in England, France, Belgium and Germany. Prior to being assigned to this headquarters he was an instructor in Military Science and Tactics at Castle Heights Military Academy, Lebanon, Tenn. He became a Warrant Officer in March, 1951.
