

## Parker Derreberry Is Found Guilty

Parker Derreberry of Andrews was tried before Justice of the Peace Sam W. Jones at Andrews Monday, on the charge of drawing benefits from the Employment Security Commission to which he was not entitled. The defendant was charged with representing himself to be totally unemployed during the week ending Novem-

ber 13, 1950, whereas, in fact, he had been employed by the Andrews Builders Supply Co., and had been paid wages on November 11, 1950.

Mr. Derreberry was found guilty and the court suspended judgment for a period of one year, on condition that the defendant pay the costs of court and repay the Employment Security Commission of N. C. the sum of \$14 which he had drawn and to which he was not entitled. The defendant met with the conditions imposed by the court.
