



To Hold Air Show July 6 At Air Park

The International Air Show and Races will be held Sunday, July 6, at the Andrews-Murphy Air Park at 2 p. m.

Participating in the aerial acrobatics will be eight spectacular acts including winners in the recent Chattanooga, Nashville, Tennessee Midget Air Races. Don Edwards of Miami, Fla., the only active exhibitionist air jumper with the Civil Aeronautics Authority License to perform exhibitionist jumps, will also take part in the show. Others participating in the show will be Ben Hutley of Charlotte; Buddy Rogers of Florence, S. C.; Gariand Pack of Nashville, Tenn.; Jimmy Wilson of Indianapolis, Ind.; and the nation's number one dual aerobatic team.

A display of the Midget Planes will be held prior to the show. The International Air Show, including the International High Speed Aerobatic Champion, will be the biggest ever held here.

Over 90 For Past Ten Days

For over a week now people in Murphy and vicinity have been complaining about the heat, and with good reason. Maximum temperatures in this vicinity have been over 90 for the last ten consecutive days, with the exception of Saturday when a high of 89 degrees was registered.

According to data released by Area Engineer John Manthey of the Hydraulic Division of TVA, Tuesday and Wednesday were the hottest days this year, with the mercury hitting 94 degrees on both days. A reading of 92 was recorded Monday and 91 Sunday.

By 11:30 a. m. today (Thursday) the mercury had already reached 89. Manthey said this is the second hottest June in seventeen years, with highest June temperatures in 1943. Last June readings of 93 were recorded for six days. In 1950 the mercury stood at 90 two days.

Weather officials see little relief in sight.
