According to data released by Area Engineer John Manthey of the Hydraulic Division of TVA, Tuesday and Wednesday were the hottest days this year, with the mercury hitting 94 degrees on both days. A reading of 92 was recorded Monday and 91 Sunday.

By 11:30 a. m. today (Thursday) the mercury had already reached 89. Manthey said this is the second hottest June in seventeen years, with highest June temperatures in 1943. Last June readings of 93 were recorded for six days. In 1950 the mercury stood at 90 two days. Weather officials see little re-
