The goal set by x-ray officials is 12,000 chest pictures in this Health District. That means every individual 15 years of age and older should get an x-ray picture between now and September 3. Units will be open each day Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m.

The following schedule gives the location of stops for this coming week: Murphy at courthouse each day; Peachtree School, August 8; Prison Camp, August 9; Andrews, August 7 to August 14. The chest picture requires no undressing, and takes only two minutes.

Catholic Church To Be Dedicated

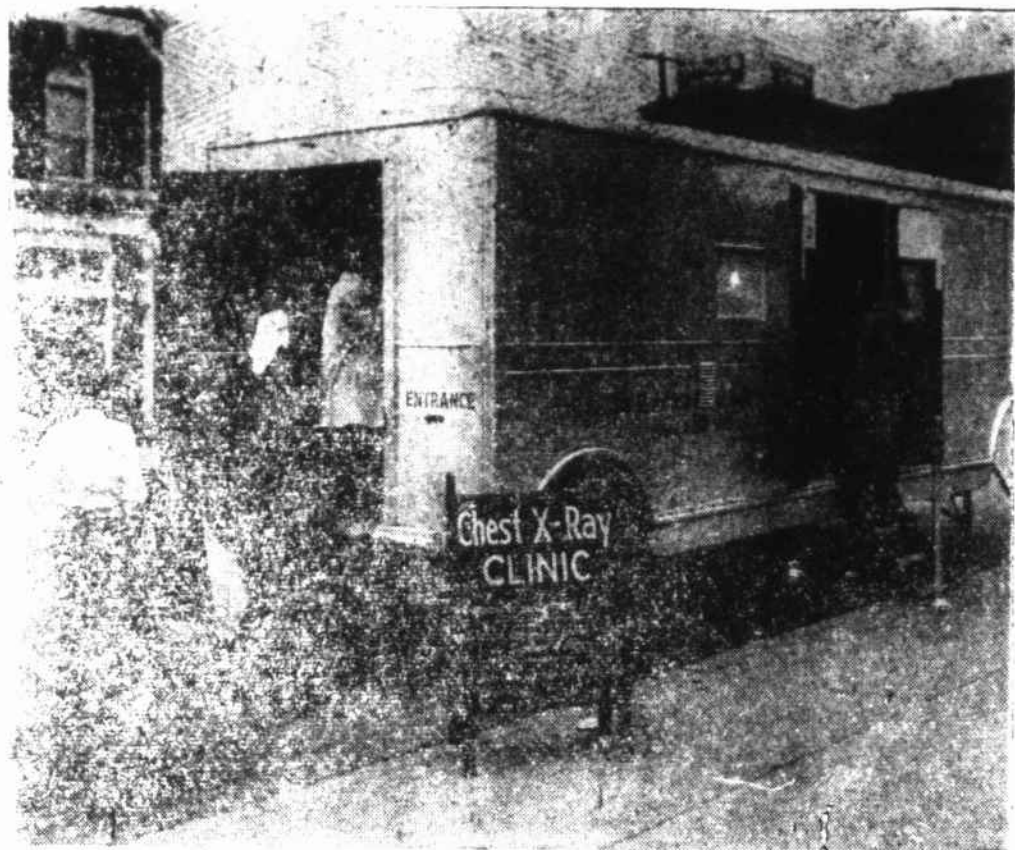

Local Employment Office Is Made Separate Branch

Murphy Employment Office has been designated as a separate office to serve Cherokee and Clay Counties. In the past the Employment Security Commission has operated the Murphy office as a branch office of the Bryson City office. The separation became effective July 1.

Jack Burrus, manager of the Murphy offices asks the cooperation of all employers in Cherokee and Clay Counties "so that we can keep a number one office to better serve the employers and employees of these two counties."

All employers are asked to list their job openings. Both employers and employees are asked to contact the local employment office regarding information on employment and unemployment compensation. Mr. Burrus points out that there is no charge for these services.

Three Injured When Lightning Strikes

During the severe electrical storm Monday evening, Mrs. Carl Derreberry, age 27, of Andrews, her seven-month-old baby and her brother, Gordon Luther, were hospitalized due to injuries received when lightning entered their home.

Mrs. Derreberry was bathing the baby near the kitchen sink when the lightning bolt entered the open door, ripping the rug, and apparently jumping to the sink. She said that she was stunned and did not see the flash. However, her husband who was in the same room saw the flash, Gordon Luther, who was sitting near Mrs. Derreberry was knocked from his chair with considerable force. Another brother had started to fill an ice tray when the tray was knocked from his hand. He was uninjured.

The baby suffered only a small burn. Gordon Luther received bruises and shock. They were both dismissed from the hospital Tuesday. Mrs. Derreberry remained in the hospital suffering from burns and shock. Her condition, however, is much improved.

Double Tragedy Befalls Ricketts

Mrs. Paul Rickett of Hayesville was found shot to death in her kitchen this afternoon (Thursday) about 2:30 o'clock by neighbors who arrived on the scene after hearing gun shots.

Her husband, who had also been shot, was found still alive, lying on the living room floor. A pistol from which two bullets had been fired was discovered beside him, according to Clay County Sheriff Guy Swanson.

Swanson said neighbors Guy Wheeler and Charles Cherry were first to arrive on the scene. They

found the Rickett's two children, but unharmed.

Rickett was taken by ambulance to Lee M. Happ Memorial Hospital in Hiwassee, Ga., where he was given a 50-50 chance to live. Swanson said the last report to him about 8:10 tonight was that Rickett still is alive.

Rickett was employed at Citizens Bank and Trust Company in Hayesville. Rickett had been transferred from the company's bank in Murphy to Hayesville only a few months ago. He and Mrs. Rickett are natives of Andrews.

Schools To Open Doors August 27

Boggs To Speak To Men And Boys

F. Ivy Boggs, Texas State Brotherhood President, will speak to men and boys at First Baptist Church, Murphy, Tuesday, August 12.

The movement is a simple plan to get a man, who is a member of a church brotherhood, to find an unenlisted boy and get him into Sunday School.

Mr. Sellers stated that an X-Ray will find tuberculosis before a person feels sick and the earlier T. B. is found, the better chances for cure. He stressed the fact that there will be absolutely no charge to the public, and there is to be no undressing. In a matter of seconds you're in and out.
