New Ordinance Is Passed By Board

The Murphy Board of Commissioners last night passed a traffic ordinance effective Oct. 27 which limited parking to one hour during specific time on the four streets eading from the Square.

One hour parking from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. will start on Peachtree St. from the Square to Central St.; on Tennessee St. from the Square to Depot St.; on Valley River Ave. from the Square to Methodist Church, and on Hiswassee St. from

The new ordinance prohibits parking any vehicle in the streets except in the parking spaces marked off diagonally along the curbings. The Board specified that whatever on the four main streets

Other provisions of the ordinance are:

Four parking spaces in front of the Post Office and four spaces in front of the Citizens Bank and Trust Co. will be marked for lim-

ited parking of 15 minutes. VIOLATIONS LISTED

Violations of the ordinance were one and parking at entrances of any alley or driveway.

Also, double parking, parking left side of the curb, not displaying proper lights, disregard to top signs, failure to obey traffic signals and obstructing traffic.

The ordinance constituted the town clerk as a traffic bureau to secept pleas of guilty and handle violators of the regulations.
