1,966 Permits Lost By Drivers

The Department of Motor Vehicles reported today that 1,966 motorists lost their legal driving privileges in October, with convictions for drunken driving leading the list with 866.

In its regular monthly summary of violations requiring the surrender of operators' permits the Department reported 145 convictions for two offenses of drunken driving; 92 for speeding over 75 mph; 84 for two cases of speeding over 55 mph; 79 for two offenses of reckless driving; 64 for driving after license revoked; and 49 for transporting liquor.

Miscellaneous violations such as larceny of automobile, hit and run, manslaughter, improper use of driver's license, unsatisfied judgement, incompetency, and a habitual violator brought the total number of October convictions to 1,966, the majority of them North Carolinians.

10,450 Violators Arrested In Month

Highway Patrol Commander W. B. Lentz reported today that his men arrested 10,450 North Carolina traffic law violators in September and issued citations to 6,758 others.

In a regular monthly summary of patrol activities Col. Lentz said his 525 troopers inspected 140,105 drivers' licenses; issued 10,154 warning tickets; corrected 28,835 defective lights; investigated 8,017 complaints; and weighed 630 vehicles in cooperation with the License and Theft Enforcement Bureau.

In addition to its enforcement duties the patrol handed out 18,091 courtesies—changing tires, giving road directions, assisting motorists in distress, etc.

The officers traveled 1,750,712 miles on routine patrol in September, using 120,890 gallons of gasoline and 7,139 quarts of oil.
