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

Meat Slaughter Is Up In State

More pounds of meat animals

were slaughtered in North Carolina for commercial distribution during the month of September by 25 per cent than in the same month last year, it was reported by the State-Federal Crop Reporting Service.

The total liveweight of meat animals slaughtered was 20,192,-000 pounds, the Crop Reporting Service stated, from 72,500 head. Slaughter was up 3 per cent over last August, with the increase attributed chiefly to cattle.

The increase in calves slaughtered over last year was 24 per cent, with a total of 776,000 pounds. The slaughter of mutton and lamb showed an increase over last year, and hog slaughter was

up a little less than 1 per cent.


