County Milk Production Reaches All Time High

provement Association said that outstanding production and accomplishments were noted by the 10 Cherokee and Olay County association members.

He said that during December, for the first time last year, average production per cow in the association rose to 606 lbs. of milk and 28.2 lbs. of fat, of the 196 cows in 10 herds on test. Thirtyseven of these cows were dry.

Mr. Walker said the dalrymen deserve commendation for maintaining the high level of production all through the fall months. The October average was 547 lbs. of milk and the November average of 524 lbs. were topped only by the April average.

The breeding of good cows and heifers for fall freshening coupled with adequate feed, care and housing, are some of the reasons Mr. Walker gave that the most progressive dairymen sold more milk in December than during any other month in 1952.

Eugene Waldroup of Hayesville was first with an average of 994 lbs. of milk and 38.1 lbs. of fat from 10 cows, one of which was dry. All of these cows are registered or grade Holsteins
