parents learned of the services provided by the Cherokee County Crippled Children's Society in cooperation with the North Carolina State Crippled Children's service.

They visited the Orthopedic chinic in Bryson City where she was seen by Dr. S. S. Atkins. Her treatment consisted of a short period in the Asheville Orthop hospital, for observation and followed by muscle re-education.

Martha Jane was seen periodically in the Bryson City clinic for the next four years.

In November of 1952 she visited the Orthopedic clinic in Andrews. At that time Dr. Atkins recommended surgical lengthening of the left heel cord, which was done early in December of 1952.

For two months she wore a plaster cast which was removed and a brace fitted.

Today Martha Jane's crippled condition is greatly improved and with the help of her brace she attends Hiwassee Dam school regul-
