Ballots Available For Absentees

Absentee ballots for voting in the Democratic Primary, May 29. are available now, Pete Stalcup, chairman of the Cherokee County Board of Elections, said this week.

Stalcup said absentees may vote provided one is 21 years of age, or will be by Nov. 2, 1954: One is a member of the U.S. military or naval service or Merchant Marines; one is the wife of a serviceman residing with her husband outside of the home county; a discharged disabled war veteran receiving treatment in a government hospital; or a civilian attached to and serving outside of the U. S. with the armed forces of the U.S.

Absentee voters must have been resident of the State of North Carolina for one year and of the precinct for four months (or will have by Nov. 2.)

Application can be made by the wife, husband, brother, sister, perent or child of the voter by indicating the relationship, but only when the voter is registered on the registration book and party affiliat ion shown. Only the voter himself can declair his party affiliation for registration.
