Hall, Brumby, Scott, Are High Men In Nominations

3,000 Vote In **Demo Primary**

A heavy Democrat primaryover 3.000 ballots cast-Saturday gave E. H. Brumby the nomination for State House of Representatives with 1,738 against 1,463 for Richard Mauney, and set up a run-off in the sheriff's nomination between J. L. Hall with 1,099 and Luke Carver with 1,052.

Other final totals in the sheriff nomination were Jake Brown, 876 and Glenn Hembree, 364.

In the U. S. Senate nomination Scott took the county with 1,609 votes and Lennon drew 1,494 in the long term balloting. In the short term, the total was Scott, 1,342 and Lennon, 1303.
