## WNC Publisher New NEA Head

A Western North Carolina weekly newspaper publisher, Ed M. Anderson of Brevard, last week was elected president of the National Editorial Association in convention at Baltimore, Md.

The NEA is a national trade association for the weekly and small daily newspapers of the country.

Mr. Anderson publishes The Transylvania Times, Brevard; the Forest City Courier; The Spindale Sun; The Skyland Post; West Jefferson and the Alleghany News, Sparta. They are located in four counties and have a total circulation of over 13,000. Four are members of the Audit Bureau of Circulations.

## Illegal Mail-Order Eye Glasses

MORGANTON—An illegal method of prescribing and ordering glasses by mail has been reported in North Carolina, and measures are being taken by the State's vision specialists to halt the process.

Dr. P. N. DeVere, Morganton optometrist and president of the State Board of Examiners, said today that an Illinois optical company, advertising "cheap" glasses, has flooded the state with literature, telling individuals how to examine the eyes of others on a house-to-house, commission basis.

The kit contains instructions, order blanks, a printed eye chart, and an "eye tester." The "eye tester" is a series of 14 lenses mounted in a strip of cardboard.

"It is foolish to assume," said Dr. DeVere, "that glasses can be fitted with a series of 14 lenses or that eyes can be examined in a matter of minutes." Dr. DeVere also pointed out that any vision problem might indicate a condition of bodily disease which would go undetected without a thorough optometric examination.

He said that steps are being taken to stop the Illinois firm from using the mails to advertise mail-order glasses and that anyone examining eyes in the state under the plan will be subject to prosecution for illegal examination of the eyes.

Any person who has been approved with offers of mail-order glasses are requested to report the incident to Dr. DeVere in Morganton.

## Egg Production Seasonally Lower

Production of eggs in North Carolina during May 1964 amounted to 123 million—6 percent below the 141 million laid during April but 4 percent above the 123 million laid during May of last year. The drop of 8 million in production from the April level followed the normal seasonal pattern.

The average number of layers on hand in the State during May is estimated at 7,512,000 or about 9 percent less than the 7,834,000 during May 1963.

Farm flocks in the Nation laid 6 billion eggs in May—4 percent more than May last year, but 2 percent below the 1949-50 average production. Egg production was above a year ago in all regions of the country.
