Luther M. Dockery, Rt. 3, Murphy, is the newly appointed member of the Cherokee County Farmers' Home Administration Committee.

S. S. Williams, the Agency County Supervisor announced this week.

The appointment became effective July 1. Mr. Dockery operates a livestock and poultry farm in this county.

The other two members of the three-member committee are Burton McNabb, Sr., who he operates his farm, general farming and poultry, and Vic Baxter, Marble, where he has operated his farm for a number of years.

Both Mr. McNabb and Mr. Baxter have been active in the County Agricultural programs of the county.

Each member is named for a three-year term, and one appointment expires each year. No member completing a 3 year term can succeed himself.

Every agricultural county in the country has such a committee to help the Farmers' Home Administration County Supervisor adapt the Agency's loan policies to local conditions including farm credit.

Before any money can be borrowed through the agency, an applicant must have the approval of the County Committee. In the case of a farm ownership loan, the farm to be purchased, enlarged, or improved must also be approved by the committee, the County Supervisor explained.
