Hunsucker Is Feared Missing On Lake

Volunteers started dragging Hiwassee Lake Wednesday afternoon after Luther Hunsucker was reported missing since around 11 a. m. Tuesday and an empty boat was found adrift on the lake.

At 6 p. m. Wednesday it was not established that the drifting boat was the one used by Hunsucker.

Clyde Dockery reported he had seen the missing man around 11:30 a. m. Tuesday near the Grape Creek Bridge in what he believed was a boat belonging to Jerry's Marine Service. The drifting boat belonged to Jerry's Marine Service.

The missing man was seen at the Marine Service dock around 11 a. m. Tuesday. But it is believed Dockery's report was the latest clue on Hunsucker's movements yesterday morning.

As the Scout was going to press it was still not established that Hunsucker had met any trouble or that the drifting boat was the one he was seen in.

However, dragging of the lake continued and Bob Cheney was surface diving in case the missing man had fallen from the boat.
