Cherokee County Fair Promises To Be Best

Fred Adams Taken On Murder Charge

A weeping Fred Adams was taken in the fatal shooting of Luther Scroggs Monday night Sept. 13 at Brassstown, surrendered to Deputy Sheriff Leonard Jones and State Highway Patrolman D. P. King at 7:45 a. m. yesterday. Witnesses said.

Deputy Jones said the only statement Adams made was "I'm sorry."

Adams, the object of an intense eight-day search by county, state and federal officers, is charged with murder in a state warrant and with unlawful flight to avoid prosecution in a federal warrant.

Deputy Jones said law officers were to start questioning Adams sometime Wednesday morning.

Jones said Adams surrendered at the home of Harley Scroggs in Brassstown. The deputy said the wanted man arrived at Scroggs' home at about 5 a. m. Wednesday. Jones talked to Adams and then

called him to telephone to Marjorie Jones said. The sheriff's office was notified, and Jones and King went to the Scroggs home.

Scroggs and the two officers in his front yard and talked to them for a moment, Jones said. Scroggs then went back into his house and returned with Adams, who gave him a gun, Jones said.

The officers said Adams was unarmed except for a small pocket knife when he surrendered.

Adams' wife was arrested in connection with the case but was released earlier this week under bond. Also arrested in the case and released under bond was N. L. King. King was charged with aiding and abetting after the fact of murder.

Kinginger was shot at his home in Brassstown. The shooting followed a short argument between Adams and Kinginger. The two men were neighbors.
