Ferebee Named Chairman Of 21-Member Hospital Board

New Site On West Property Is Selected

Percy B. Ferebee last week was named chairman of the 21-member board of trustees for the new District Memorial Hospital of Southwestern North Carolina.

Others elected to the board at a meeting of incorporators of the hospital Friday at the Andrews City Hall are: Tony Ayers, R. B. McPhew, Smith Howell, L. W. Wilson, Ed Ingram and C. P. Sawyer of Robbinsville; Cline McClure, Walter R. Johnson, Joseph G. Rutledge, R. N. Tiger, Walter Moore and James H. Walker of Clay County; P. B. Ferebee, chairman, Robert E. Heaton, W. D. Whitaker, L. B. Nichols, H. M. Whitaker, Sam Jones, W. W. Ashe, S. J. Gernert and Jeff Brooks, of Valleytown Township, Cherokee County.

Officers serving with Ferebee are W. D. Whitaker, vice-chairman and Robert E. Heaton, secretary-treasurer.

The three officers, along with Smith Howell and Joseph Rutledge, make up the executive committee.

Meanwhile plans for the construction of the hospital are moving along after the second choice site was selected for the construction. The first choice—the Sam Cover property—was not available.

The hospital will be constructed on the West property (next to the old Riverside Hotel site) across the highway from the Cover land.

The West site has been surveyed and engineers have made a topography and are preparing a map of the some six acres. Attorneys are at work examining the property title, the chairman said.

Funds to meet the local portion of the hospital have been placed in a special account, Mr. Ferebee said.

Representatives from the new board of trustees have been authorized to accompany representatives from the architectural firm to Raleigh to meet with the Medical Care Commission on final plans for the 30-bed hospital design, Mr. Ferebee reported.

United Nations Observance Planned Through Churches

The ninth birthday of United Nations will be observed here Sunday, Oct. 24 and the week beginning Oct. 15.

Miss Edna Bishop, chairman of the county observance, said the idea of the week is to "promote the United Nations and to familiarize the public with workings of UN". She said exhibits are planned by churches, schools and clubs.

Since United Nations Day comes on Sunday, Miss Bishop said, the chief observance will be planned through the churches. Local ministers have been asked to touch on UN in their services Sunday.

Friday through Sunday next week church bells will ring at noon, calling citizens to pray for world peace.

A public film showing on the UN will be held Thursday at the Murphy Library and programs are planned in the week by the Martha's Creek PTA and to all the county schools. Lloyd Hendrix is chairman of United Nations Day observance in the schools.

"Coons" Offered For Restocking

Another coon might soon be another Tar Heel who makes the Manteo to Murphy trip if sportsmen in this section ask that racoons be stocked here.

The North Carolina Wildlife Commission is encouraging the restocking of racoon in WNC by offering its services as an intermediary between live trappers in Eastern North Carolina and sportsmen's clubs and individuals in this section.

To get racoon, clubs and individuals can get forms to fill out from the Wildlife Commission. The form should be filed with the Commission before Oct. 15.

Trappers in the east will start trapping with nets Oct. 15. It is believed that the physical condition of the "Coons" will be better with net trapping than under the steel traps system.

The animals are being trapped earlier this year, the Commission said, so that they can be caught while they are still fat and while there is still a food supply in WNC.
