A full Cherokee County Republican ticket swept into office Tuesday with 16 precincts out of 18 reporting and with some 6,500 people voting.

The GOP victory marks the first full Republican ticket to win office in this county since 1939. The two precincts not reported-Culberson and Ogreeta-will not change the result tallied from the other precincts.

Democrats took only four out of the 16 precincts reported. Precincts that went Democratic were Andrews, South Ward; Brasstown; Murphy, South Ward; and Peachtree.

GOP'ers took an early lead in the returns Tuesday night and never once gave up first place tothe Democrats.

Unofficial totals are: for senator Moore. 2,907; Wright, 3,456; for representative, Brumby, 2,984; O'-Dell. 3,313; for clerk of court, Sneed, 2,955; Radford, 3,491; for register of deeds, Hensley, 3,070; Graves, 3,511; for sheriff, Hall, 2,742; Anderson, 3,768; for coroner Miller, 2,801; J. C. Townson, 8,-500; for district one county commissioner, Jones, 909; Hyde, 1,032; L. Townson, 1,489. W B. Dockery was unopposed in district three.

The only county Democrat to win election was Herman Edwards 210. They won out over Frank J. who was unopposed for judge of Recorder's Court.

Thad D. Bryson of Bryson City Democrat, was unopposed for the Solicitor in the 20th Judicial District.

In the state races the Democrats came out on top in all contests. Rep. George A. Shuford of Asheville was reelected over Republican Charles W. Cunningham. Former Gov. Kerr Scott had 22.-093 votes to Republican Paul C. West's 26,864 with 683 of 2,024 precincts reporting.
