Graham Com. Enters Contest

Friday, March 25th marked a stepping stone date for rural communities of Graham County, for on this date the Panther and Wolf Community organized into a rural Community Development Organization and requested application for entrance into the Western N. C. Contest sponsored by the Asheville Agricultural Development Council.

This is the first community in the county to organize for the purpose of making their community a better place in which to live.

The program consisted of remarks and comments on Rural Development work by D. G. Allison, Vocational Agricultural teacher in the community, W. H. Flake county agent, Nellie Jo Carter, home agent, and R. L. Holland, Assistant County Agent. Mr. P. L. Brendle, teacher & president of an organized community group in the Grassy Br. Community of a neighboring county made a talk on the why's and how's of organized communities and named some of the projects that his community

had worked on.

The meeting was then made into a discussion group with various farm men and women expressing their desires to see what their community could do. The meeting was attended by six farm women, 12 farm men and nine young people, or a total of 27.

Further appointments of committees was delayed until the next regular meeting which will be held on Monday night, April 18.

The first community project selected was putting running water into their church, that work was to begin Sat. March 26th. Tentative plans were made on community signs and mail box stands. Other projects will be selected at later meetings.
