Bids Be Opened On New School Building May 8

Bids for a \$85,000, nine-room elementary school building will be opened in Supt. K. S. Clem's office in Robbinsville, May 8, Gilmer Harrell, architect-engineer for the project, said.

The brick or stone veneer building will be constructed between the present elementary school and the gym in Robbinsville.

The new school will contain four primary rooms, three elementary rooms, one multi-purpose room that can be divided into two classrooms, and administration offices.

The project will include a furnace which will be used to heat the present buildings plus the new structure.
