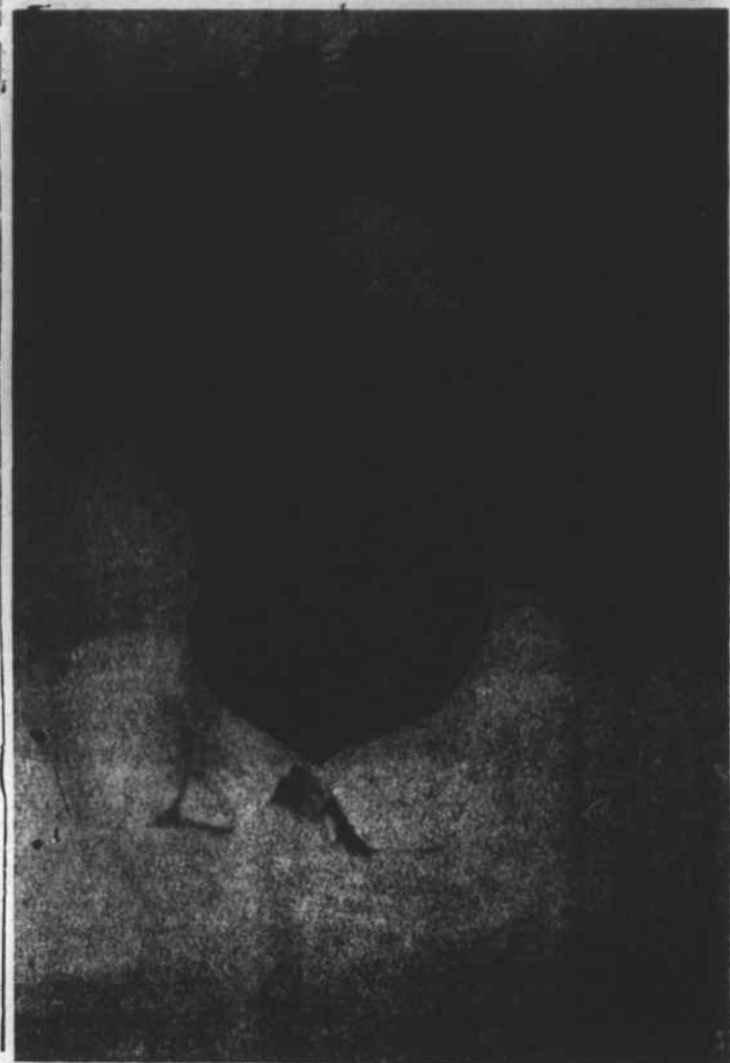
Fred Bates left Wednesday for the University of North Carolina, to enter law school.
