Cottage Cheese Cake Recipe Told

Take cottage cheese off the lettuce leaf and peach half and give it a chance as an ingredient in more exciting dishes.

Actually cottage cheese is a wonderful meat substitute, according to Mary Morgan, State College extension nutritionist. It's rich in complete protein and in riboflavin. And it's a low-calorie dairy product, which is good news for those on reducing diets.

For a cool summer dessert, one that's nutritious and lower in calories than ice-box pies and ice creams, try a cottage cheese cake.

COTTAGE CHEESE CAKE
 1 six oz. package zwieback or graham crackers
 1/2 cup butter
 1 1/2 cups sugar
 3 cups cottage cheese
 4 eggs
 1/2 cup coffee cream
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/4 cup flour
 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon rind.
 Roll zwieback or graham crackers into fine crumbs. Mix with 1/2 cup sugar and melted butter. Pack all but 1/2 cup of mixture on bottom and sides of well-greased nine-inch spring pan. Press cottage cheese through a fine sieve or beat with electric mixer until smooth. Combine eggs and remaining 1 cup sugar and beat until light. Add cream, salt, flour, lemon juice and rind, cottage cheese and mix well. Pour into crumb-lined pan and sprinkle lightly with the remaining 1/2 cup crumbs. Bake in moderate oven (325 degrees) for 1 hour. Turn off heat and leave in oven for 1 hour. Remove from oven and allow to cool.

Milk Production Was High In May

Estimated milk production on farms in N. C. totaled 162 million pounds during May of this year, according to information recently released by the N. C. Crop Reporting Service.

Production during the month compares with a flow of 149 million pounds during April, the difference representing about the normal seasonal increase.

Further production during May was only one million pounds short of the all-time high for the month which was reached during May of last year.

There were an estimated 367,000 milk cows on farms in the state during May—12,000 fewer than in May 1954. Thus, the average production per cow last month was 442 pounds—the highest of record for any May. For May of 1954, milk cow numbers are estimated at 379,000.

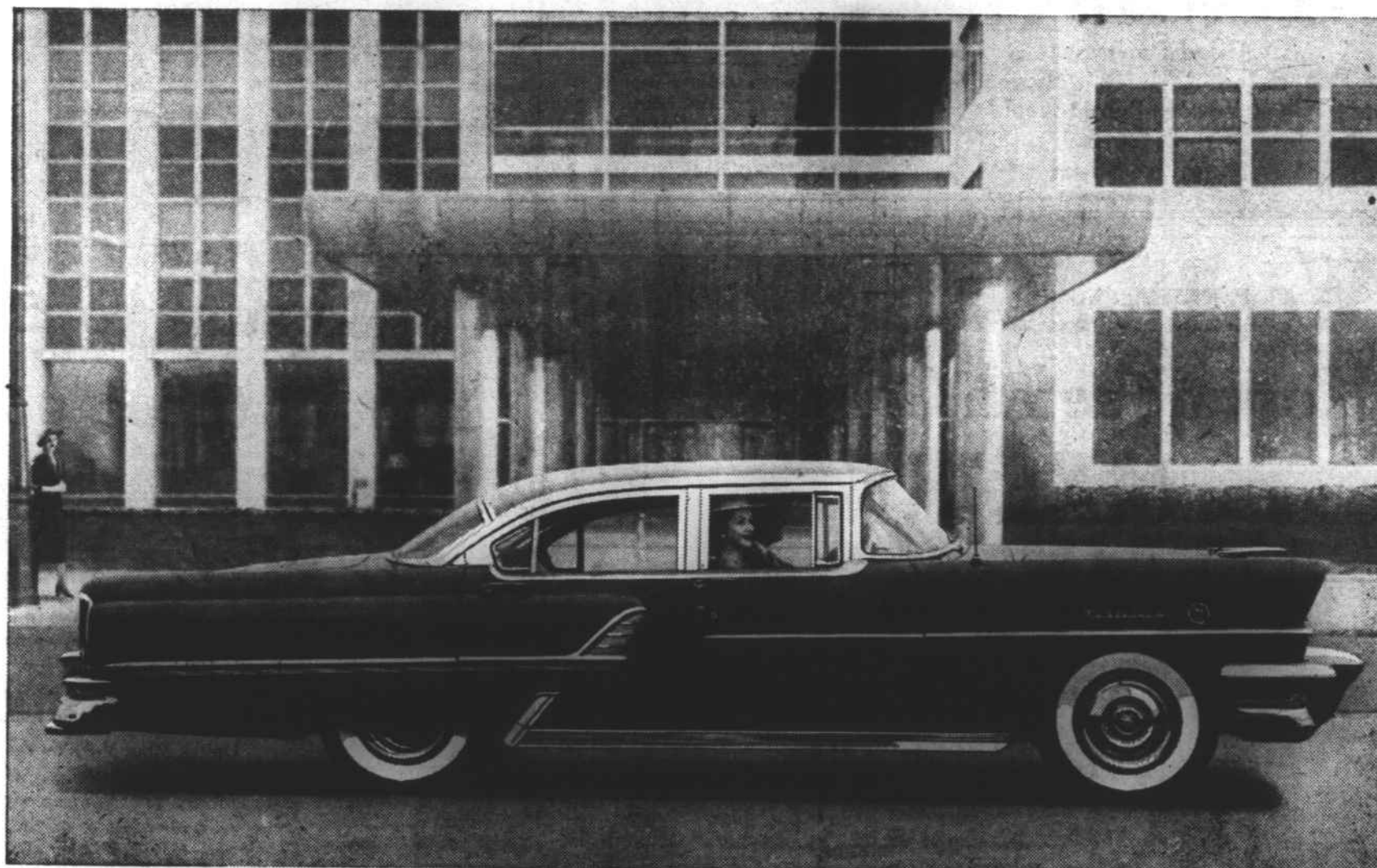
