

Andrews Takes 1st Defeat Of Season

The Robbinsville Blue Devils pulled the upset of the year Friday night when they stopped the injury-laden Wildcats 20-19 on their home field.

It was Andrews' first defeat in two regular seasons of play and blurred their hopes of repeating as Smoky Mountain Conference Champions.

Robbinsville went into the lead early in the game. The Blue Devils received the opening kickoff and launched a drive to the Andrews two where Ray Stewart plunged over for the score. Clifton Williams added the extra point.

In the second period, the Blue Devils again took the ball and increased their lead when Gene McMonigle scored from the 10.

The Wildcats snapped back for their first score early in the third quarter. Quarterback Lloyd Derreberry drove over from the two to climax an 85-yard drive. Robbinsville rounded out their scoring minutes later as Williams broke loose for a surprise 55-yard touchdown run. Dennis Cooke added the extra point to put Robbinsville out front 20-6.

The Wildcats rallied for two fourth quarter touchdowns, but their failure to make one of the the extra points spelled defeat. Ray Ellis climaxed a 47-yard Wildcat drive with a two-yard touchdown plunge. Jimmy Holland added the extra point from placement.

The Cats launched an 87-yard march later in the period. The score came on a 31-yard pass play from Derreberry to Holland.

The 'Cats will end their regular football season tomorrow night when they play host to the Murphy Bulldogs in a homecoming game.

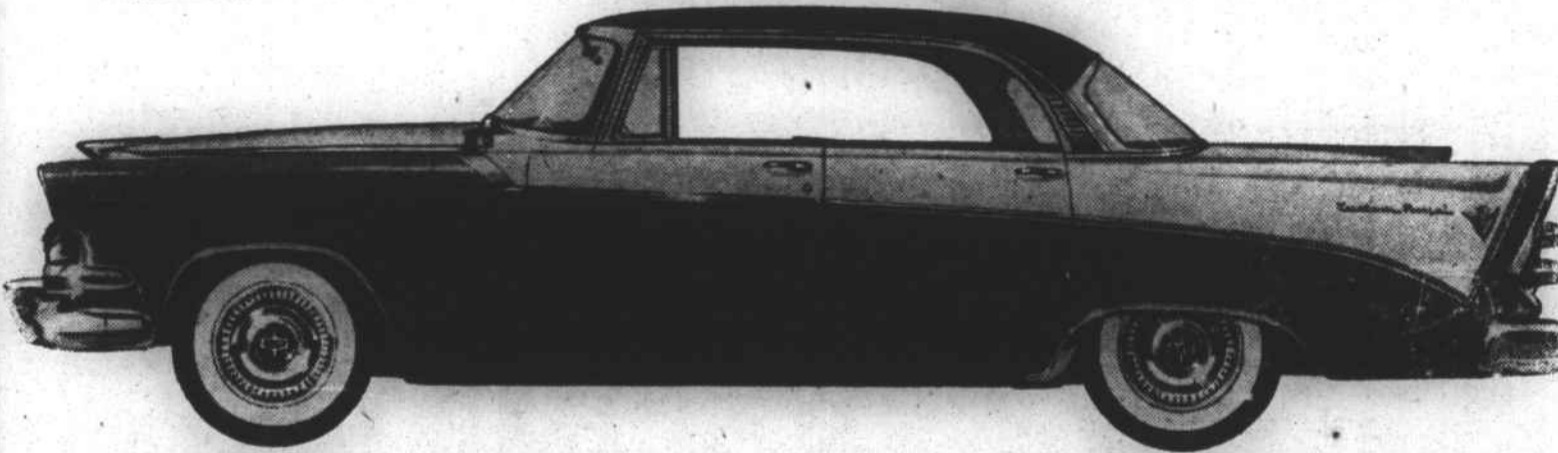
