Messer and H. Bueck, civil defense director, said the Murphy GOC will not be able to join in the 24 hour watch without the help of additional volunteers.

If volunteers do not phone in and offer their help before the alert starts the Murphy GOC will have to be discontinued, Messer and Bueck said.


