Before you enter an exhibit, read over carefully in the instructions in the catalog. Be sure to enter the exhibit in the proper class. Have it properly labeled. If the class calls for a plate of 12 specimens be sure that you have twelve -no more and no less.

In vegetable exhibits, specimens should be of best marketable size Greater profits? Standardize on except where the catalog calls for pumpkin. Where the class calls egg production and body size. for a plate, tray, peck or bushel, as nearly alike in size, shape and color as possible, and they should be free from blemishes and have Mrs. W. D. 
