Rev. Ernest Misenheimer Lutheran Evangelism Missioner In Andrews

Th Rev. Ernest L. Misenheimer Lutheran Church in Andrews will be the missioner for the Lutheran Evangelism Mission to be held at St. Andrew's Evangelical Church in Andrews, North Carolina, November 11 — 15. The Rev. V. I. Gobins, Pastor of St. Andrew's will be the liturgist.

The Mission services will begin with the 11 o'clock Service on Sunday. Evening services will be held every night Sunday through Thursday at 8.00 p. m. Pastor Misenheimer has announced that the theme for his services of sermons will be — "GOD WANTS YOU". The individual sermon topics are listed as follows:

Sunday Morning, Nov. 11—"God Wants You to Walk with Him", Sunday Evening, Nov. 11—"God Wants You to be His Parade Ground" Monday evening, Nov. 12 "God Wants You to be a Faithful Steward", Tuesday evening, Nov. 13 - "God Wants You to Find Yourself", Wednesday evening, Nov. 14 - "God Wants You To Remember Life's Goal," Thursday evening, Nov. 15 - "God Wants You to Keep the Faith."

The evening services will have provisions for congregational singing, Vespers with a sermon by the missioner and question-answer period in which members as well as the visitors will have the opportunity to raise questions concerning Christianity in general and Lutheranism in particular.

Miss Ardith Hay will be the organist at all the services. The Rev. Ernest L. Misenheimer is Assistant to the President of the North Carolina Lutheran Synod Pastor Misenheimer's responsibility

as Assistant to the President of Synod include the promotion of stewardship, evangelism and home missions throughout the Synod as well as serve as a general assistant to the President. The Rev. Dr. F. L. Conrad. He is the first to serve the Synod in this capacity.

Pastor Misenheimer received his A. B. degree from Lenoir Rhyne College, Hickory, N. C. and B. D. degree from the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, Columbia, S. C. At present time Pastor and Mrs. Misenheimer and their 4 sons are residing in Salisbury.

The preparations for the Mission Week at St. Andrew's are being completed under the leadership of the congregational evangelism committee consisting of Marjorie E. Ennis and L. M. Gilbertson Co-chairmen; Dr. L. L. Ezzell - Prayer; Miss Frances Cover - Lay Visits; Mrs. James Baer - Publicity; Mrs. Marion E. Ennis - Hospitality; Herman K. Brauer - Music; Mrs. Vitolds Gobins - Telephone and Mrs. Margaret C. Watry - Finance.

In connection with the Lutheran Evangelism Week lay visitors of St. Andrews, in pairs, will make calls at homes of Lutheran Church members and persons interested in the Lutheran Church to encourage to make Christ the most important part of their lives. The calls on prospective Church members will be made between 7 and 8 P. M. Monday through Thursday. Following the Mission Week a pastor's Class will be held for the prospective members with the first session being held on Sunday, November 18, at 7:00 P. M.

The purpose of the mission is to help every Church member realize that his primary responsibility is to be a witness for Christ, and that therefore each member is a home missionary. The Church also seeks to reclaim and reactivate the lapsed and inactive members and to confront the unchurched in our community with an invitation to unite with the Church and to worship Christ.

Visitors will be welcome at all the Mission Week services and are urged to take active part in them.

N. C. Crop Sunday Be November 11

November 11th is CROP Sunday in North Carolina, beginning the eighth annual week of united effort by town and country churches to combat the world's food shortage. Pastors will participate and explain the work of the Christian Rural Overseas Program of Church World Service to their congregations. During the days following volunteers will go from farm to farm and from house to house seeking gifts of food, fiber, and cash to fight hunger and distress throughout the world. Thirty North Carolina counties are expected to conduct organized campaigns and most of the others will participate in various ways. Among the commodities to be solicited are wheat, corn, cotton peanuts, and milo. A bale of cotton or a carload of grain may be exported from the county providing it. Smaller units will be converted into cash and to gether with the cash donations used to provide costs of distributing overseas certain surplus foods released free by the United States government. The cost of distributing surplus wheat, corn, rice, beans, and dairy products is estimated at less than one cent a pound.

Crops appeal will be held for the benefit of the neediest among India's 45 million flood victims, Pakistan's flood stricken. Hong-kong's 1,500,000 Chinese refugees, war orphans and other destitute in Korea, one million displaced Arabs refugees in Turkey, Greece, Italy, Germany, and Austria, and the victims of natural and manmade disasters in other countries of Asia, Europe, and South America. Three hundred million pounds of food and fiber have been distributed among the destitute of 50 countries since 1945.

Rev. Elmer Hassell To Speak At District Workshop
