His re-nomination will be voted on at the annual meeting of all stockholders to be held in the Buncombe County Courthouse on March 23 at 10 a.m.

President Clarke announced that the 1956 Federation sales totaled over \$7,000,000 and that of this amount nearly \$6,000,00 was paid back to farmers for poultry, eggs, tobacco and other farm products.

Paul Nave, Cherokee County farm agent, expressed the opinion that farmers who "rode out the storm" during the low price poultry situation would eventually make good money from chickens and eggs. He encouraged Cherokee County farmers to call on his office whenever the extension service could be of help to them.
