fusion would cost the patient or the patient's family from \$25 to \$50 if it had to be obtained from a commercial source or donors provided in the ratio of two donors for every pint used.

It is entirely probable that Blood Program facilities in Cherokee County would provide residents of the county with Red Cross blood which if purchased through commercial sources would cost the recipients of the blood more than the announced goal of \$2,500.

Eventually we hope your chapter will have many more good supporters like THE CHEROKEE SCOUT. Thanks again for your support of this worthy cause.
