FARM QUESTIONS

QUESTION How high should I cut fescue lawn grass in the summer?

ANSWER: If cut close and frequently it will thin out rapidly. Set the mower about three inches high. Closer, frequent clipping will kill it.

QUESTION: How can I save some of the surplus from my big crop of perennia pasture?

ANSWER: The surest way of saving Ladino clover or other such forage is to cut the excess for silage. If you have Ladino-grass containing over 70 per cent moisture (unwilted), be sure to use a preservative preferably one that absorbs moisture such as 125 to 150 pounds of corn and cob meal with 150 pounds of chopped straw per ton. If feed is wilted, use 125 to 150 pounds of corn and cob meal or eight pounds of sodium metabisulfite. Cut when grass heads emerge.
