He was a native of Hayesville. He is survived by the widow, the former Sadie Lee Odom of Murphy, whom he married in 1918; one son, Lawrence, one daughter, Mrs. Bruce

M. Love was a high school principal and teacher from 1914 to 1915 and 1917 to 1926. During 1923-25, he was principal of the Weaver-ville schools. He also taught at Haw Creek. He was a member of the Buncombe County Democratic Executive Committee from 1928 until 1930; a member of the Buncombe County Board of Education from 1930 to 1933; corporation counsel for the Town of Weaver-ville, 1928-33; and attorney for the County Board of Education from 1935 until he was named assistant attorney general.

Funeral services were held Friday, Nov. 13, at Edenton Street Methodist Church in Raleigh. The Rev. Embree H. Blackard, pastor of Asheville's Central Methodist Church, officiated. Burial was in Lewis Memorial Park Saturday.

The jury deliberated for more than two hours and was not able to reach agreement.

S. S. Birchfield, 47, of Andrews was acquitted by Superior Court of shooting James Dillingham, also of Andrews.

Birchfield pleaded not guilty to

the charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

Birchfield testified that he shot Dillingham in self defense, thinking that Dillingham was carrying a concealed weapon. One of Dillingham's arms was in a cast and the other hand was in his pocket.

In the case State versus Robert Hedden, Judge Patton ordered Nov. 17 that a previous judgment on Hedden be stricken from the record and a new sentence be imposed. The new sentence ordered is that Hedden be confined nine months to the common jail of Cherokee County.

Hedden, who was charged with cutting Policeman Glenn Bates was sentenced to 12 months in the common jail during last week's session of Superior Court.

Report On Local Flood Conditions To Be Presented To City On Nov. 23

A TVA flood study of the Hiwassee River, Valley River, and Peachtree Creek has been completed. The report on the study will be presented to the city on Monday night, Nov. 23, by officials of the State and TVA, according to Mayor L. L. Mason.

Colonel Harry E. Brown, Director of the State's Department of Water Resources, John R. Hampton of WNCRPC, and John W. Weathers and Edward J. Rytter of the Tennessee Valley Authority will be present to present the report and discuss it. The meeting will be in the Power Building at 7:30 p.m. Mayor Mason and Commissioners, President W. D. Townson and officials of the Chamber of Commerce, and Chairman C. L. Alverson and

members of the Cherokee County Development Corporation are expected to be present.

Town and county officials in the Murphy area have realized that local flood problems must be recognized and considered if the best overall plan for development of the area is to be effected. Working through the North Carolina Department of Water Resources and the Western North Carolina Regional Planning Commission, the Town, Chamber of Commerce, and Cherokee County Development Corporation jointly requested the assistance of the Tennessee Valley Authority in preparing a comprehensive flood study along the Hiwassee and Valley Rivers. The study was also to include Peachtree Creek, a tributary to the Hiwassee River four miles upstream from Murphy.

Flood problems in the Murphy area are the result of high water on the Hiwassee River and its tributary the Valley River which joins the main stream at Murphy. Peachtree Creek, a smaller tributary of the Hiwassee River flowing into it about four miles above Murphy, is also responsible for periodic damage to valuable agricultural lands along its flood plain.

The Murphy study is one of a number that TVA is making to aid communities in the Tennessee Valley. Much of the report is based on work that TVA has been carrying on since its beginning in connection with its water resources operations throughout the Tennessee Valley. In its regular program TVA has assembled information on rainfall, runoff, and other technical data bearing on the occurrence and magnitude of floods in localities throughout the region.
