Kiddie Park Will Open Tuesday

H. L. McKeever, Chairman of the Murphy Summer Recreation Board, announced today that the Kiddie Park will open May 31, with Mrs. Ruth Cheney in charge.
 The Park will be open for all children under 7 years of age from 9:00 to 12:00 in the morning and 2:00 to 5:00 in the afternoon, Monday through Saturday. The Park will not be open on Sundays.
 The Park contains two small swimming pools, shower and toilet facilities, a first-aid station, a telephone, swings, sand piles, and horizontal bars and monkey cages. All children under 7 years of age are invited to attend the Park as often as they wish under experienced adult supervision.
 Mrs. Cheney suggests that very small children should be accompanied by an adult.
 This year marks the 7th consecutive year during which the Kiddie Park has been in operation. All funds which go to pay the Supervisor and maintain this recreational facility are raised by public subscription.

 On the national level, there are two Republican candidates seeking election to the unexpired term in the U. S. House of Representatives held by the late David M. Hall. They are Heinz Rollman of Waynesville and Jack Shuler of Robbinsville.
 Those running for the 12th congressional seat on the Democratic ticket are Shelby E. Horton Jr., Roy A. Taylor, and Thad D. Bryson Jr.
 This race is for the unexpired term of the late Mr. Hall plus a full term. Therefore the names of the candidates will appear twice on the ballot.
 The counties that make up the 12th district are Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Haywood, Henderson, Jackson, Macon, Swain, Transylvania, and Buncombe.
 Four candidates are campaigning for U.S. Senator. Senator B. Everett is seeking re-election. Opposing him are Addison Hewlett, Robert W. Gregory, and Robert M. McIntosh.
 On the ballot for lieutenant governor are H. Cloyd Philpott, David M. McConnell, and C. V. Henkel.
 Candidates for Associate Justice of the State Supreme Court are Clifton Moore and William J. Coker. Mr. Coker is a native of Asheville.

Highway Patrol To Check For Drivers' Licenses

 State Highway Department records show a steady and substantial increase in vehicle registration. The driving population is increasing as many reach driving age each year.
 However, contrary to the general increase in registration and
