In the late game of the doubleheader, the Chicks outscored the White Sox of the National League 5 to 1. Wayne Watson was the winning pitcher; Jimmy Cole, the loser.

The Red Legs behind the steady pitching of Eddie Palmer scored at will throughout the game. Big gun in the lineup was second baseman Dickey with three hits and two runs scored. The Redlegs had Carter at shortstop, Phillips on first, Dickey at second, Palmer pitching, McQuire behind the plate, Malone in right, Little on third base, Sizemore in center field and Bayless in left.

In the Giant lineup, pitcher Stiles and second baseman Smith collected the only hits given up. Others in the lineup were Potter, 3b; Baker, ss; Townson, cf; Parker, rf; Ramsey, lb; and Jordan, lf.

Rescue Squad Planned For Cherokee County

Futile efforts to recover the body of a man believed to have drowned on Hiwassee Lake have resulted in a concerted drive by Cherokee County residents to form a volunteer rescue squad.

A meeting is scheduled in Murphy Thursday and formal action to organize may be taken at that time.

To be called Cherokee County Rescue Squad, it would be called into action at any time for a mission of mercy, to aid in event of disaster or accident where life is endangered.

Interested citizens started the move after Fred Honeycutt of Burnsville, N. C., disappeared. Rescue squads were called from adjoining counties to search Hi-

wassee Lake since Cherokee has no such organization. The search finally was abandoned after all recovery efforts failed.

A proposed constitution for Cherokee County Rescue Squad has been drawn up and action on this may be taken at Thursday's meeting.

When formed, the organization will set about to obtain full rescue equipment.

Members of the squad will be limited to Cherokee County residents who are 21 years of age or older. The unit will be headed by a captain, assisted by lieutenants and sergeants.

The constitution points out that the new organization would hold regular training sessions and that members would wear uniforms.

Train Slated To Arrive Here Monday

Wagon Train, one of the highlights of the year in this area, will begin rolling toward Murphy Sunday.

The third annual event, this year's spectacular promises to be the largest ever staged.

Covered wagons and horsemen from Tellico Plains, Tenn., will begin the 45-mile trek to Cherokee County before daybreak Sunday.

Purpose of the event is to focus attention on the need of developing to its full tourist potential the mountain area lying between Tellico Plains and Murphy. Nearly all of the picturesque area lies in the Cherokee National Forest and the Natchala National Forest.

Many persons plan a great part of the year for Wagon Train, outfitting wagons and getting together their colorful frontier costumes.

"Miss Wagon Train of 1960" will be crowned during the festive occasion and "Miss Junior Wagon Train of 1960" also will be named. This will take place Monday afternoon at 5:30 in Murphy.

The Wagon Train is expected to reach Murphy some time in the afternoon next Monday.

Sunday will see religious services at all local churches in the morning followed by recreation in the afternoon.

Monday will be the big day with water sports, parades, square dancing and the beauty contest scheduled. (See accompanying story for full calendar of events.)

The Wagon Train will camp overnight at the North Carolina-Tennessee state line.

North Carolina Highway Department cleared the route to Tellico Plains. They dispatched a crew and two road machines to work over the road. Workmen cut and cleared away trees and overhanging bushes. Plans were made to replant the bridge over Dockery's Creek.
