The Life and Times of Henry Berry Lowry

The following testimony is taken verbatim from a transcript of a trial held in the October Term of Superior Court in Robeson County in 1870. Andrew Strong, by some miracle, had succeeded in implicating John Taylor to the extent of having him charged as an accessory to the fact of the murder of Malcolm (Mak) Sanderson.

State of N.C. vs. John Taylor
In The Superior Court
Robeson County,

whom you knew and if so, state who they were?
A. I saw Badier and J.J. McLaughlin and Giles Inman.
Q. Where were you first tied with the rope now in Court?
A. In Mr. Taylor's field.
Q. Did the tying take place before or after the two men you mention had returned from Mr. Taylor's home?
A. After they had returned from Mr. Taylor's home.
Q. How many of you were tied together, and in what manner?
A. Two, Malcolm Sanderson and myself, each of our arms were pinioned by our side from the elbows, and then we were tied together.
Q. Where did they carry you to next?
A. They carried us to W.C. McNeill's place and stopped in the lane.
NOTE: William C. McNeill was John Taylor's father-in-law. A possible explanation as to why the posse of men led by Capt. Murdoch McLean, a Home Guard veteran, wanted to get Taylor's approval before executing the two Indian men is taken from the book "To Die Game" by W. McKee Evans: "Taylor was a wealthy man and a prominent citizen, but he was not in the county establishment. Why did the actual commander of this band, Acting Captain Murdoch McLean, a Home Guard veteran, need the approval of this civilian, who had no official civil authority? A possible explanation is that Taylor may have been an officer in the Ku Klux Klan or some other secret society."
