## Robeson Towns Slated To Share \$30 Million DOT Grant

RALEIGH — The Department of Transportation has announced allocation of Powell Bill funds for 446 municipalities in North Carolina, amounting to \$30 million.

These allocations are made on the basis of one cent of the eight-cent tax on gasoline and will be disbursed no later than October 1.

These funds are established for use on local streets but not on those federally or state maintained.
