#### 13 Hogs

First known hogs brought to the United States were the 13 animals which arrived on the coast of Florida in 1539 with Hernando de Soto and his conquistadors. Hog numbers have come a long way since then. Last year, it is estimated that some 63 million hogs were marketed. Hog production, however, was down slightly last year due to high production expenses. The record for hog marketings was in 1971 when some 94 million hogs were marketed.

Henry Berry Lowry symbolizes the hopes and aspirations of all Lumbee Indians everywhere. He is a true and larger than life, hero to all Lumbee Indians.

This is the second year that Lumbee Homecoming will sponsor the Businessman of the Year. In years past, the Lumbee Indian Businessmen's Organization has chosen the previous four winners of this most coveted award in the Indian business community.

### CRITERIA

Should be a Lumbee Indian who has demonstrated moral and civic responsibilities and has exercised moral and ethical practices in his business affairs. Should be a person who has helped distinguish Lumbees as competent businessmen. Person must be profit motivated as exhibited in the economic growth of the business he is involved in. Must have promoted the Economic Development of Lumbee Indians by encouraging or motivating other Indian persons to become more involved in the economic and business mainstream.
