MacLEAN, MRS. EPPS RECEIVE ALUMNI AWARDS AT PSU

PEMBROKE — Hector MacLean presented the Pembroke State University Alumni Association's "Distinguished Service Award," and Mrs. Grace Epps was honored with the "Distinguished Alumnus Award" here Saturday night at the association's annual spring meeting. MacLean is chairman and chief executive officer of Southern National Corp. and Southern National Bank of North Carolina. As a state senator, he introduced the bill which made Pembroke State a university in 1980. And this academic year, a chair in business and finance was endowed by MacLean at PSU in honor of his late father, former Gov. Angus MacLean. Mrs. Epps for 25 years served as elementary



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
