The guest preacher for the installation service will be the Rev. Herbert Meza, Pastor of the Church of Pilgrims in Washington, D.C. Dr. Meza, a well-known preacher in the Presbyterian Church U.S., has been a missionary in Portugal, and the organizing pastor of a church in Texas, and for the last eight years the Pastor of the Church of the Pilgrims in the nation's capital, where he has spoken out on such controversial matters as the war in Vietnam, open government, the world economic order, and urban problems. Most recently Dr. Meza was one of several U.S. pastors and theologians to tour Cuba. He is the author of The Cross, The Kiss, And The Tomb, and To

Serve The Present Age.

Mr. Robinson has recently moved to Pembroke with his wife, Helen, from Washington, DC where he organized and directed the Pilgrimage Hostel Program, a short term residential study program for visitors in the nation's capital. His ministry in remembrance will be directed toward campus Ministry at Pembroke State University and the Pembroke community.
