PSU Wins Hallsboro Mountain Rolls By Road Race Pembroke

ATLANTA — For the second time in four years Pembroke State University's cross country team won the Stone Mountain Road Race here Saturday, topping a field of 17 teams.

In fact, the Braves were so strong that their "B" team finished fourth.

Tom Childress of the Florida Track Club prevented PSU from making a complete sweep by taking the individual honors over the five-mile course. He ran it in 24:14 for first place.

Pembroke runners, however, took four of the top 12 spots individually and nine of the top 32.

Pacing the Braves for the second straight meet was Jeff Moody with a fourth place time of 24:40. Eighth was Garry Henry with 24:52. Other places for the Braves were: 11. Wayne Broadhead 25:04; 12. James Plummer 25:05; 21. David Lewis 25:31; 22. Tom Harris 25:36; 24. Dan Ryberg 25:42; 27. Ricky Jackson 25:48; and 32. Pete Gibson 25:54.

"It was a real good team effort," said PSU Coach Ed Coan. "This is the best team we've ever had and is closely knitted together."

Next meet for the Braves in their own PSU Invitational next Saturday at 11 a.m.

Maxton IEA supports supper for parents

The Maxton Indian Education Act Part IV sponsored a supper for the Indian parents of the Maxton City Schools. The purpose of the supper was to invite parents out to learn more about the Indian Education Program and what it is doing for Indian children in the Maxton district.

Dr. Dalton P. Brooks of Pembroke State University was the guest speaker at the meeting. He spoke of the conflict facing native Americans in the school system and things that parents could do to bridge the gap in the educational system.

Dr. Brooks pointed out that language is a handicap for native Americans because most of us speak a non-standard variety of English, thus imposing restrictions on academic achievement, vocational opportunity, and social advancement.

What is important to the Indian parents and to the children is that we must do everything we can to learn standard English. Standard English is the English that is acceptable and understood by the vast majority of the people in our society.

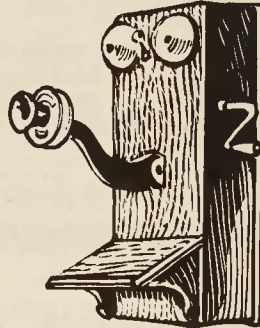

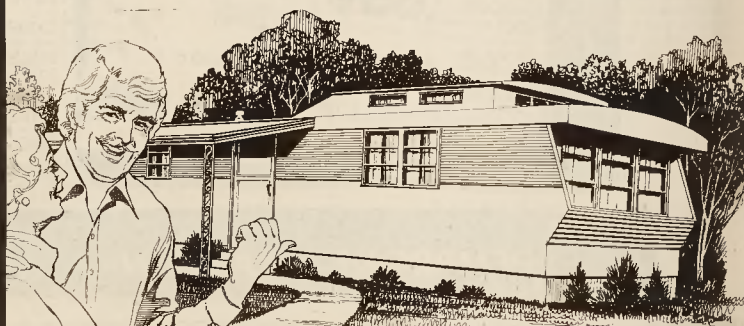
