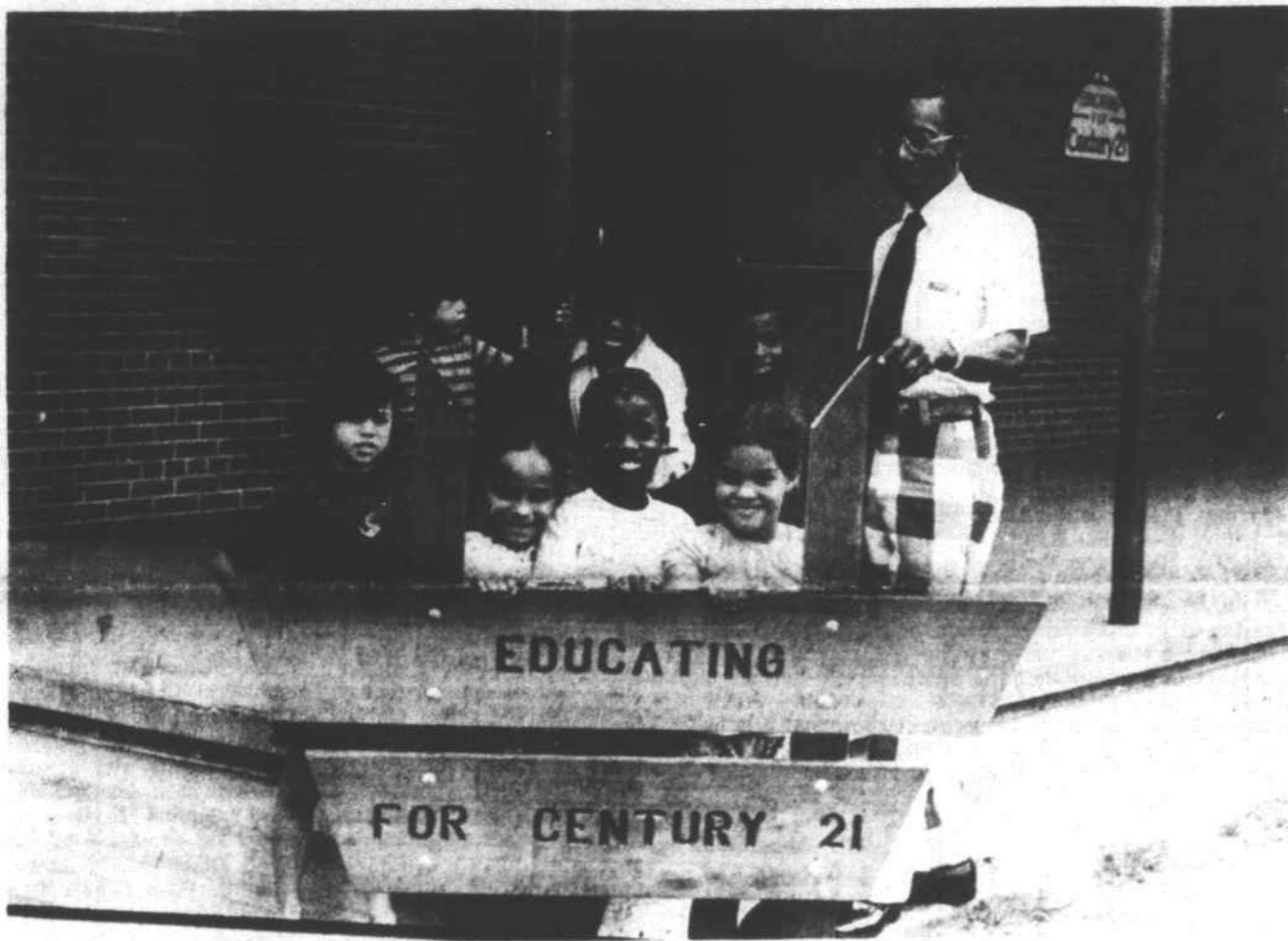

IT'S SCHOOL TIME AGAIN AS COUNTY SCHOOLS OPENED MONDAY

School began in Robeson County on Monday, August 28, with very few problems. Children attended school for a half day on Monday. Tuesday was a teachers work day. And school began regular session on Wednesday, Aug. 30, 1978.

There are several changes this year. Among them is a new policy adopted by the board of education to enforce the district lines. Meaning that children who reside in a particular school district will not be allowed to go to school in another district. As this is the first time that such a policy has been adopted, there have been the usual resistance to change, but the problems have been minimal. As parents become more familiar with the policy, the adherence to the policy will become more and more acceptable.

The groundbreaking for the new Pembroke Elementary School was held earlier this month. And a new Robeson Elementary School will be built shortly. There is a new woman principal at Piney School, Mrs. Ann Brinkley. Because of the The Occupational Education Center began this year at Holly Branch School. With these kinds of changes, one can expect education in Robeson County to become better and better each year. At least some constructive things are being done under the administration of Supt. Patrick Sycet and the Robeson County Board of Education.

COME BACK LITTLE SHEBA TO BE PRESENTED

Auditions for William Inge's powerful drama, "Come Back Little Sheba" will be held on Monday, Sept. 4 and Tuesday, Sept. 5 at 7:30 p.m. in PSU's Performing Arts Center. Directed by Communicative Arts Instructor Dick Smith, the play is scheduled to run from October 12-14.

This is the story of a deep-seated frustration in marriage, and of its inevitable and furious eruption. Set in the mid-west in about 1950, the play revolves around the three major characters: Doc Delaney, a quiet, soft-spoken chiropractor in his early 40s; his wife Lola, a frowsy, inane housewife in her late 30s; and Marie Buckholder, their pretty, precocious college boarder. Involved in the plot are eight other integral characters: Turk, Marie's jock boyfriend; Mrs. Coffman, the Delaney's German neighbor; Bruce, Marie's successful fiance; Ed Anderson and Elmo Huston, two of Doc's friends; the milkman, a weight lifting enthusiast; the mild-mannered postman; and a Western Union messenger.

"Come Back Little Sheba" is an intense and demanding play. Since the rehearsal period is only about 5 weeks, practice session will be held on Sunday afternoons and Sunday through Thursday evenings. Not every character will be required at all rehearsals. Auditions are open to all community members with the understanding that PSU students will be cast when possible.

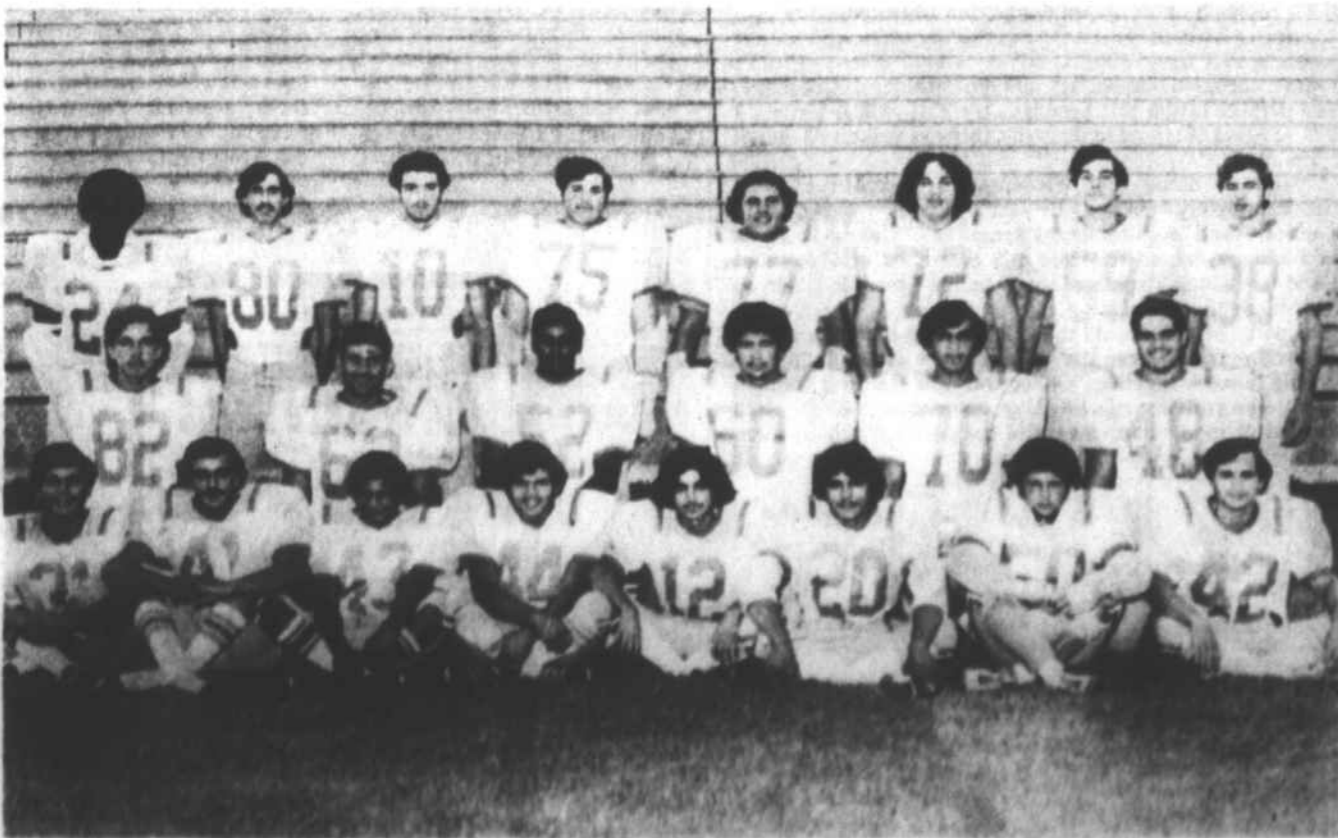
