He is assigned to Battalion Landing Team Two Slant Eight (BLT 2/8), based at Camp Lejeune, N.C.

"Display Determination" is designed to demonstrate and improve NATO's capability to reinforce and resupply Southern Europe.

His command has joined with forces from Belgium, Greece, Italy, Portugal, Turkey, the United Kingdom and the Federal Republic of Germany for the exercise.

The exercise began with ships from Portugal, the United Kingdom and the U.S. rendezvousing in the Eastern Atlantic. This naval force proceeded through the strait of Gibraltar and joined with additional American and Italian ships in the Western Mediterranean. Other surface ships, submarines, and land based aircraft are acting as 'aggressors' and simulating attacks as the NATO ships transit the Mediterranean for an amphibious landing in Southern Greece.

Chavis joined the. Marine Corps in June 1976.
