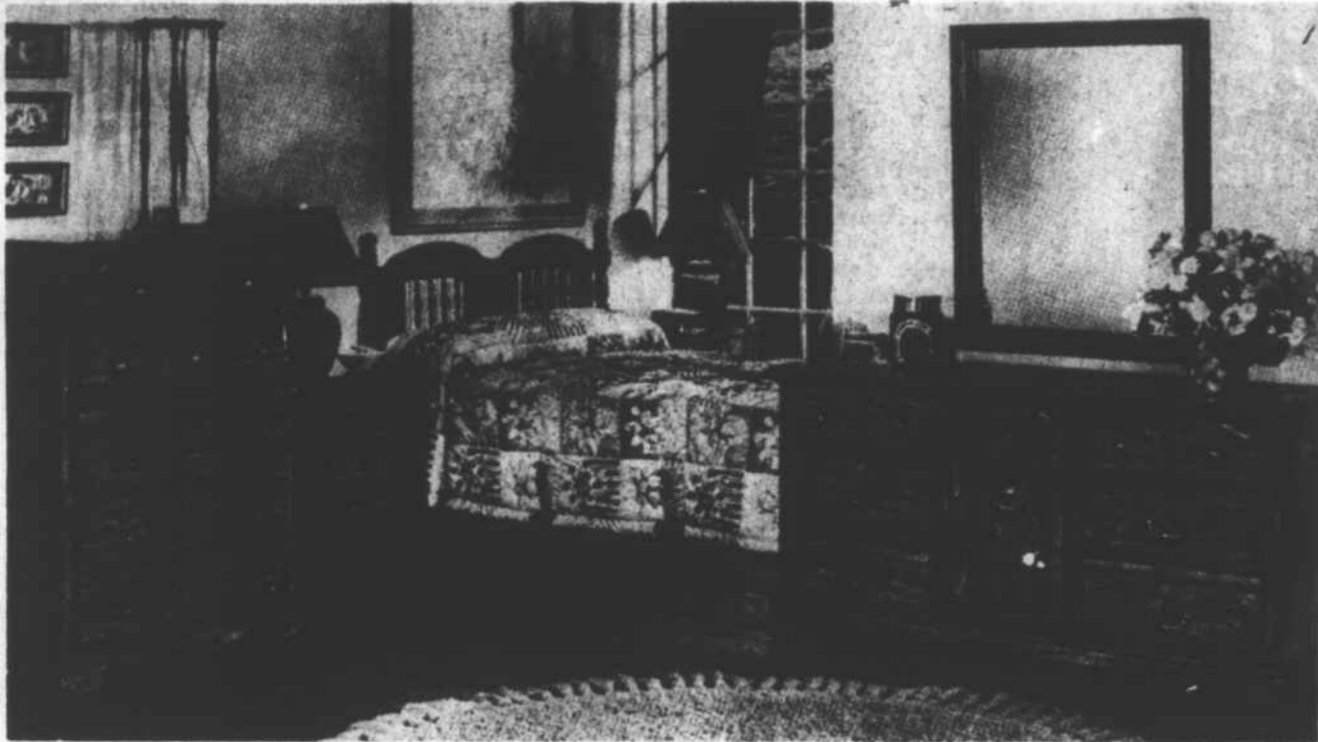

Coach Ronnie Chavis said in a pre-season interview that leadership from his four seniors was vital to the Warriors' chances this year. He has not been disappointed.

Traveling to Hoke County last Friday, Pembroke suffered a 10-0 loss to the Bucks. Coming back the next day on their home field, the Warriors pounded Hallaboro 8-2 on the strength of good defense and strong pitching by senior Dwylan Locklear. But it was another senior who provided the fireworks in the win that evened Pembroke's record at 2-2.

Kevin Sampson, who plays the centerfield position for Pembroke, sent a Harvey Baldwin fastball into deep right-centerfield in the bottom of the fourth inning for a grand slam homerun to open up a 8-1 lead for the Warriors. Hallaboro never recovered from that shot although they did manage to score a run in the top of the fifth.

Kevin's homerun was the first of the year for the Warriors. But it is not only his batting prowess that has made him valuable to the team. His feet are not made of lead and Kevin has used this to his advantage with aggressive baserunning. In the Warriors' 4-3 win over Lumberton last Wednesday, it was Kevin who scored from third base with the winning run on Bobby Taylor's sacrifice fly to shallow rightfield.

Not to be overlooked are his defensive talents. He is most adept in centerfield, stealing sure hits on with running catches and on one occasion, a diving catch.

Pembroke Senior High is fielding a relatively young team this year. With the leadership abilities shown by Kevin Sampson and the other seniors on the squad, the Warriors should do well in the tough 3-Rivers Conference.

Kiwanis Hear About Croft Metal Co.

Mr. Donald Raborn, Vice President of Croft Metal Co. of Lumber Bridge was the guest speaker at the Tuesday evening meeting of the Pembroke Kiwanis Club. He was introduced by Lankford Godwin, program chairman, who is an employee of that company.

Mr. Raborn is a native of Louisiana and became associated with the Croft Metal Company 17 years ago. The company is owned by Mr. Brancroft who is now 76 years old and still active in the business.

In 1975 Croft came to Lumber Bridge. The aluminum operation employs about 800 people and expansion is planned which would include a new parking facility for trailer traffic and 30,000 more square feet of manufacturing space. Since the opening the present plant four years ago the total growth has been 256 percent and the annual payroll approximately 5 million dollars. It is a self-contained company with distribution centers throughout the South. All three races of the County are equally represented in its employees as well as equal representation of both sexes. The company manufactures and sells a complete line of aluminum building materials.
