PSU TO HAVE SPECIAL THANKSGIVING CONVOCATION NOV. 20

A special Thanksgiving Convocation—service—will be held at Pembroke State University's Performing Arts Center Tuesday, Nov. 20, at 11 a.m.

This is a PSU first—and it is a noble idea by Chancellor Paul E. Givens.

PSU classes at 11 a.m. will be cancelled so students can attend the service.

Letters are being sent to churches throughout the area, inviting their members to the service. In this way PSU is joining the region it serves in special thanks for the blessings that are ours.

Dr. John T. Russell, professor of Education at PSU who serves as associate rector of Trinity Episcopal Church in Lumberton, will be the speaker. He has a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Seabury-Western Theological Seminary at Northwestern University and a Master of Sacred Theology degree from the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn.

"I think this is a wonderful idea," says Dr. Russell. "I think it will help to unite the University and the surrounding communities."

Speaker Russell has a tremendous background. His other degrees are an A.B. in History from Oberlin, O., College and a Ph.D. in Adult Education from Indiana University. He has also done post-doctoral work in Psychology at Columbia University and was a visiting scholar for two summers at Harvard University.

During World War II, Dr. Russell served as Chief of Signals in China with the "Flying Tigers." He was a cryptographer, enciphering and deciphering messages for Gen. Claire Chennault. As a 19-year-old, he had 40 men under him.

Others on the program are Rev. Lawrence Hardy, Berea Baptist Church; Winston Hardman, PSU Baptist Campus Minister; and Rev. Ray Sparrow, Pembroke's First Methodist Church. The PSU Concert Choir will also perform, led by Dr. Harold Slagle. The Choral Benediction was composed by Dr. William Fritz.

This service should be especially uplifting to all as we express our thanks to God for His goodness to us.

PSU HAS FIRST PLANNING RETREAT IN SEVEN YEARS

Thursday through Saturday will be the time for a planning retreat for Pembroke State University at Pinehurst. Some 40 members of the PSU administration and faculty have been invited. Consultants will also be on hand as the University takes a good look at its self and where it is going.

Discussion groups will be led by Dr. Thomas Leach, chairman of Communicative Arts; Dr. Charles Jenkins, dean of academic affairs for programs and faculty development; Dr. James B. Chavis, vice chancellor for student affairs; and Dr. Kathryn Rifeigh, chairperson of the Psychology Department.

PSU had a retreat similar to this at North Myrtle Beach, S.C., in October, 1972, with 47 taking part. This was a special conference on

Curriculum Reform. Included were five of the nation's most renowned experts on changing curriculum to fit the times.

It is hoped that new strengths will be gained from the Pinehurst retreat.
