TOMMY SWETT ELATED OVER NEWEST GRANT

Tommy Swett, who is always smiling anyway, is really beaming these days - especially after his "Upward Bound" program at Pembroke State University received a grant of \$108,595 for the 1980-81 fiscal year.

This is the biggest grant his program has ever received - and the program is in its seventh year.

This Thursday, Friday, and Saturday will see the N.C. "Upward Bound Olympics" at PSU with schools with "Upward Bound" programs throughout the state competing athletically at PSU. It is an excellent way for many youngsters to see the fine facilities of Pembroke State. Alphonzo McRae is coordinating the "Upward Bound Olympics" for the second time in three years. He is a special counselor for the PSU program and, of course, a former PSU basketball All-American.

Larry Brooks, who also works with the "Upward Bound" program, reports that 75 youngsters are involved this summer. They attend classes in the mornings, work in various places on and off campus in the afternoons, and play athletics in the evenings.

"We have youngsters gaining work experience everywhere," says Brooks. "We have them assigned to law offices, the newspaper, drug stores, medical clinics, the veterinary hospital, child care centers, the recreation center, the rural health program, "Strike at the Wind," the

junior high recreation program, etc., and all over the campus."

These are among the reasons that PSU was chosen this year by the U.S. Office of Education as one of 15 demonstration projects in the United States. A job well done!

And the handsome Swett was also master of ceremonies at the recent "Miss Lumbee Beauty Pageant!"

BIGGS WORKING HARD FOR PSU FOUNDATION

Furman Biggs, the mayor of Lumberton who is a new member of the Board of Directors of the PSU Foundation, Inc., is not just occupying a chair at board meetings. He is working with great gusto!

Biggs is burning the road between Pembroke and Lumberton, staying on top of plans for the \$100-a-couple dinner scheduled in September to raise money to make the erecting of the Bell Tower at PSU a reality. We believe this will be one of the most exciting events ever to take place on

the PSU campus. Any money raised above the \$10,000 needed to erect the tower will go into a University scholarship fund.

Splitler will be discussing the PSU Men's Basketball School which is scheduled Sunday through Friday, July 20-25. At last report over 100 were registered for the camp.

Splitler, who is also coordinator of the Braves Club, reports that the club has already received \$700 in memberships for the 1980-81 season, far ahead of its pace last year.

A recent PSU Board of Trustees report noted that last year's Braves Club membership totaled 138 persons with \$3,400 being contributed to the University athletic scholarship fund.

FORMER DEAN VISITS CAMPUS

Dr. Kenneth Kersh, who served as Dean of Academic Affairs for PSU until resigning in 1971, was back on campus last week as the special guest at a reception. Dr. Kersh is now president of Arkansas Tech. University in Russellville, Ark.

Kersh did much of the early work toward making a graduate program possible at PSU. In fact, he was appointed Dean of Graduate Studies in 1970. He spent 10 years in serving PSU and has many friends here.
