Students are referred to the Title IV Part A Indian Education Project by classroom teachers and school principals. All applications are screened by the project for certification of eligibility for participation and documentation of OE 506 forms on file. In addition, school records and other reports are screened to ensure that students meet the criteria for admission to the educational enrichment programs. After initial screening, the applications are considered by a joint committee of Title IV Part A Indian Education staff and members of the Title IV Part A Indian Education Parent Committee, at which time students are approved for financial assistance and sponsorship by the Title IV Part A Indian Education project to participating institutions.
