

Dr. James B. Chavis, Dr. Dalton Brooks featured at Educational Conference

The public is invited to join Governor Jim Hunt, Congressman Ike Andrews (D-Raleigh), Congressman Mervyn M. Dymally (D-CA), and some of North Carolina's leading educators at Shaw University in Raleigh this Saturday at 9 a.m. when they will meet to evaluate the current status of science, mathematics, and technical education in North Carolina schools.

The conference will also serve to introduce to the State Mr. Donald Bielman, newly appointed Director of the North Carolina Microelectronics Research Center. Bielman, who will deliver the luncheon keynote address, assumed his new position this week. Formerly of the General Electric Corporation, Bielman will address the role of industry in scientific and technical education.

More than twenty other educational experts from across the State will offer panel presentations on the present state of science and mathematics in primary and secondary schools, on the status of student preparedness for university level technical studies, and on the role of private industry in education.

Among the panelists will be Dr. Paul Taylor and Dr. Robert Jones, Directors, respectively, of the Science and Mathematics Divisions of the State Department of Public Instruction; Dr. Larry Blake, President of the North Carolina Community College System; Mr. Phil Wynn, Jr., President of Durham Technical Institute; Dr. Cleveland Hammonds and Dr. Delma Blinson, Superintendents, respectively of Durham and Greenville City Schools; State and local school boards will be represented by Wake County Commissioner Elizabeth Co-field, Dr. Dalton Brooks of Robeson County and Dr. James Chavis of the State School Board; Mr. Wayne Dillon, middle grades specialist for the State Department of Public Instruction will represent junior high schools; university representation in-

cludes Dr. Larry Clark, Associate Provost of NC State University and Dr. McLouis Clayton, Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs and Research at Shaw University; industrial representatives include William Bell of IBM and Mrs. William Gary, Sr. of the Computer Sciences Corporation.

The conference will also feature presentations by leaders of two special programs which have drawn much attention in North Carolina. The North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics in Durham will be represented by its Director Charles Eilber and Dr. Cecily Selby of the school's Advisory Board. Selby was recently appointed co-chair of a National Science Foundation Commission which is charged with recommending a national Federal Policy toward scientific, mathematical and technical education. Discovery Place, a very successful experimental program in Charlotte aimed at extending museum resources to the classroom will be represented by its Director, Dr. Freda Nicholson.

Joining Governor Hunt to represent government will be Congressman Ike Andrews (D-Raleigh), a member of the House Education and Labor Committee, Congressman Mervyn Dymally (D-CA) a member of the House Science and Technology Committee, State Representative Lura Tally (D-Fayetteville), Chair of the High Education Committee, Representative G. Malcolm Fulcher, Jr. (D-Atlantic Beach), House Chair of the Education Appropriations Committee and Mr. Ben Ruffin, Special Assistant to the Governor for minority affairs.

The conference is jointly sponsored by Governor Hunt, Congressman Mervyn Dymally, and President Stanley Smith of Shaw University. There is no registration fee. Participants wishing to attend the luncheon and keynote address will, however, pay a \$6.00 catering fee.
